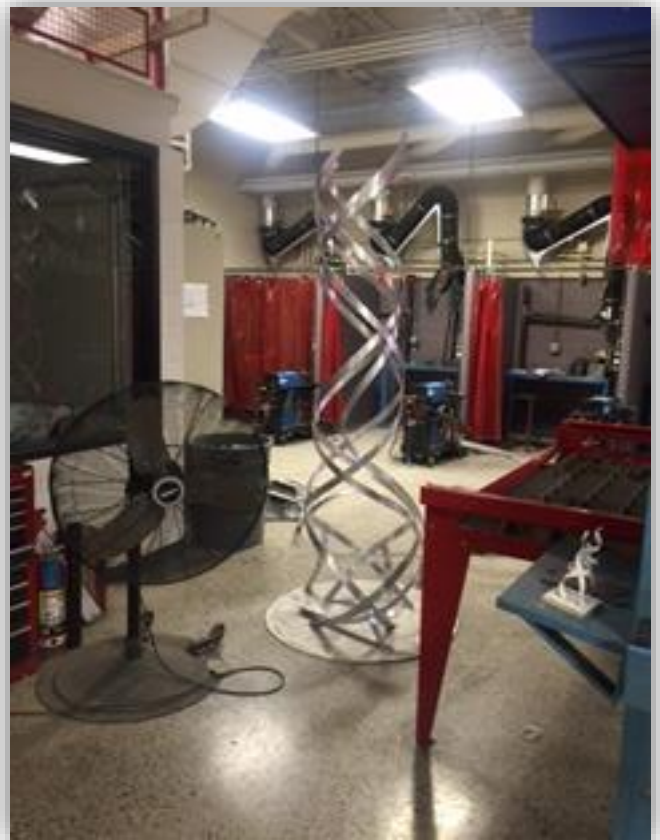

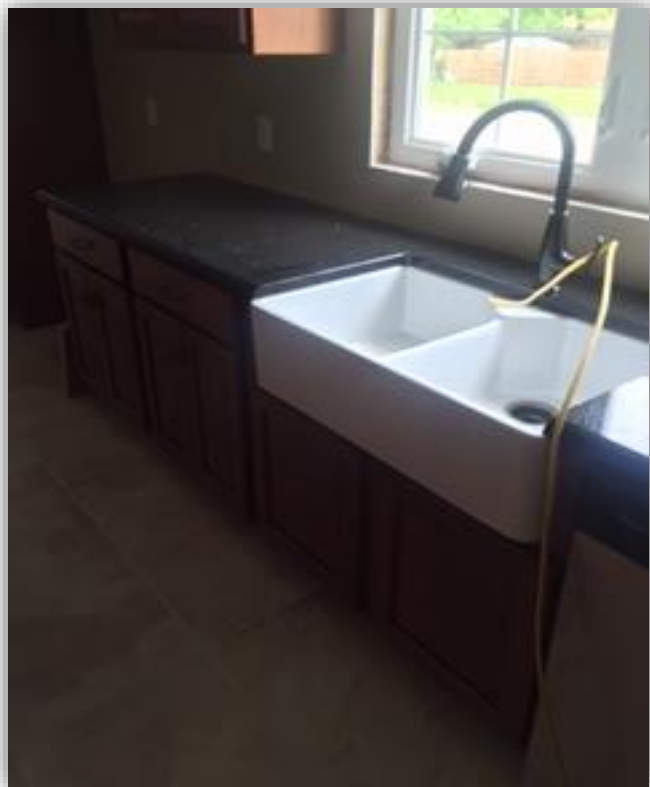

Melissa Roll, Social Studies:

Students in Mrs. Roll’s classes participated in a weekly Twitter project from January to March, responding to retweets from the Presidential candidates and having intelligent conversations about government policies and practices.

This activity was a useful tool as the students had a real-world authentic experience interacting with current issues on the national stage. Students integrated digital citizenship skills and practiced online safety at the same time. This activity extended the classroom learning as students responded at all times of the day and created meaningful social studies connections in

the real world. The students responded immediately to Mrs. Roll's comments and questions since their phones are typically connected to Twitter. Through this activity they discussed the current presidential race with not only their classmates but also other students at Apollo and other followers on Twitter. The students often included the candidates in their responses but have yet to be retweeted by them. However, some students were followed and retweeted by several Political Action Committees and organizations. This lesson incorporated a number of important standards including:

1. Opportunities for civic engagement with the structures of government are made possible through political and public policy processes.
2. Political parties, interest groups and the media provide opportunities for civic involvement through various means.
5. As the supreme law of the land, the U.S. Constitution incorporates basic principles which help define the government of the United States as a federal republic including its structure, powers and relationship with the governed.
7. Constitutional government in the United States has changed over time as a result of amendments to the U.S. Constitution, Supreme Court decisions, legislation and informal practices.
8. The Bill of Rights was drafted in response to the national debate over the ratification of the Constitution of the United States.

What Did You Learn? Budget Project Review questions

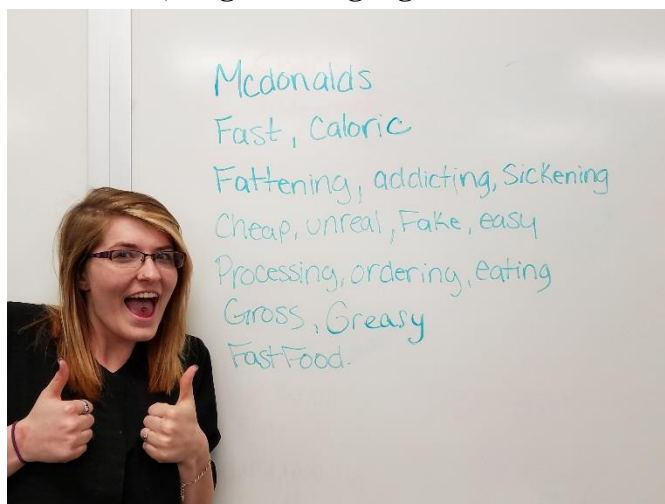
1. What costs were the most surprising to you?

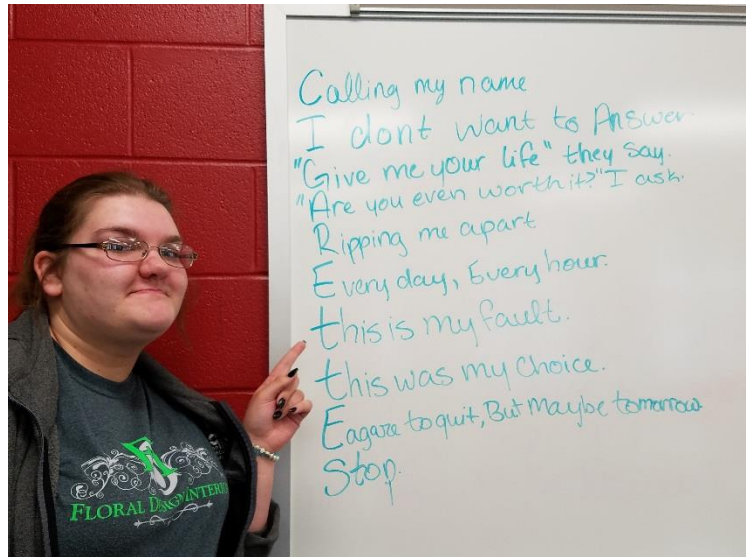

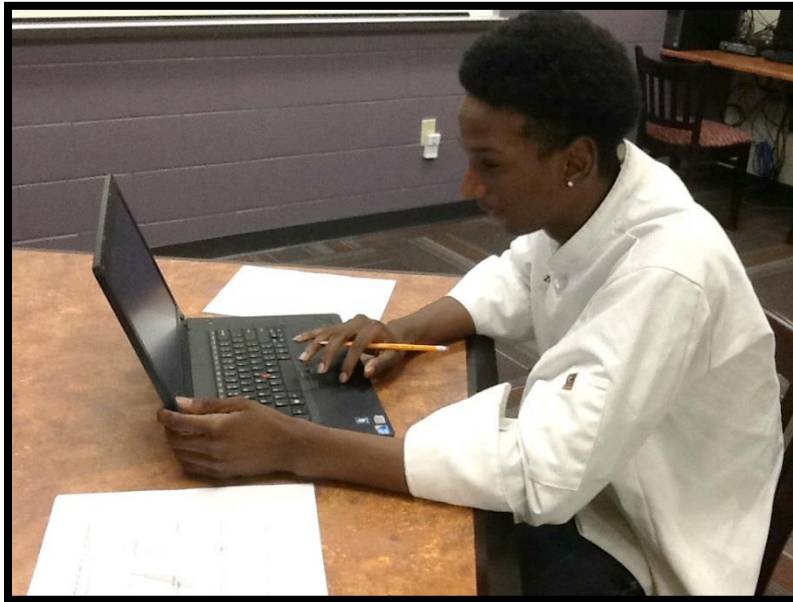

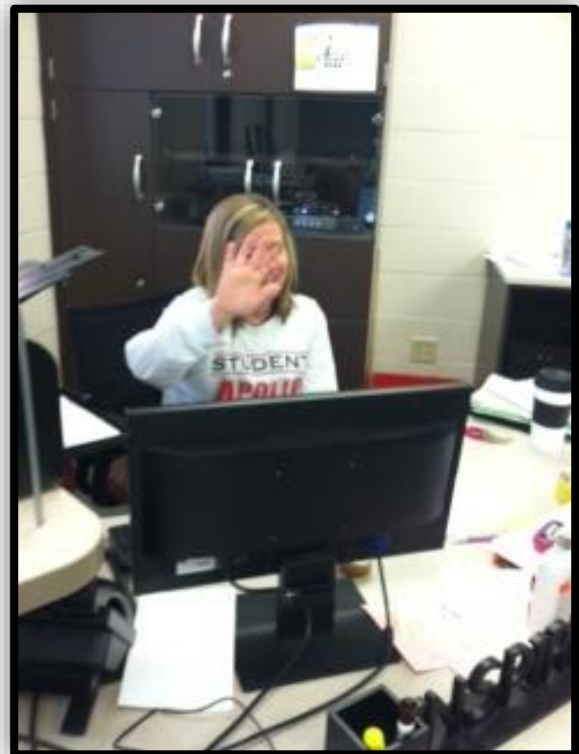
