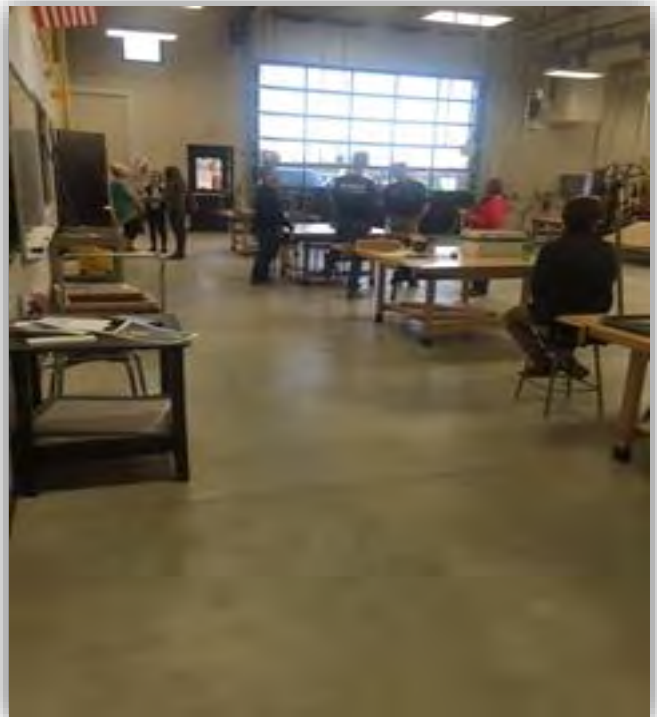

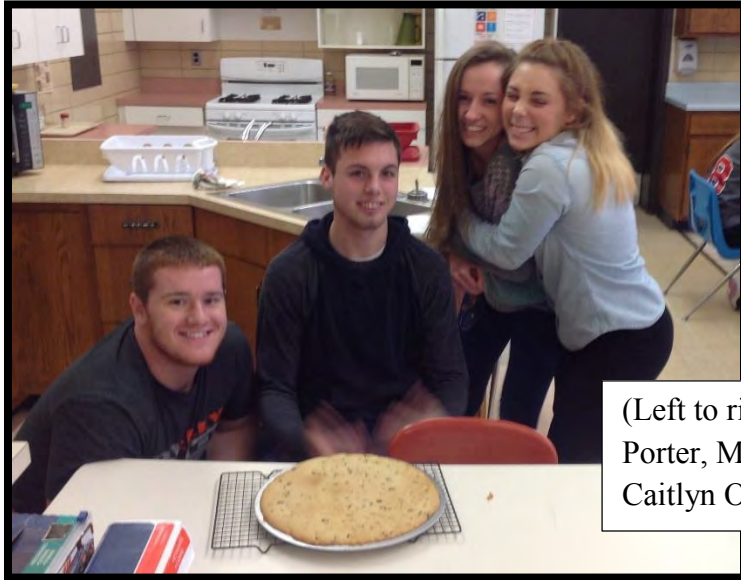

Project Update:

- Site work: Site grading, site concrete and seeding/landscaping have started and are ongoing.
- Area D Box: Punch List has been issued and punch items are being completed.
- Area A New Connector: Punch List has been issued and punch items are being completed.
- Area B SE Classrooms: Punch List has been issued and punch items are being completed.
- A Main Building: Paint is almost complete, have a few touch-ups. Casework, flooring, doors/hardware, plumbing fixtures and existing roof demo are complete. All devices, windows, ceiling pads and preliminary clean are complete.
- Building A: Demo, plumbing rough-in and duct rough-in are complete. Electrical rough-in is ongoing. Patch floor/walls and light fixtures are ongoing. Windows and metal studs are complete. Metal siding/brick veneer, paint and grid have started.
- Area B NE Classrooms: Mechanical piping and duct rough-in are complete. Flooring, sprinkler drops, welding gas system install, devices, welding fume exhaust equipment, grid, casework, doors/hardware, ceiling pads and preliminary clean are complete. Tech cabling is ongoing.
- Area E West Offices/Restaurant: Rain water system is on hold, waiting for hook-up. Rough-ins and non-bearing will be off and on through fall/winter. This area will be used as filler work. Finish work will start next summer.
- LEED Update: We are tracking around 75% for waste management, 20% for recycled content (with items remaining to be submitted), 30% for regional materials (with items remaining to be submitted) and IEQ credits are in place.

Facilities:

- Safety Committee Meeting was on March 15. Topics included accident reports, WCOSC Awards Banquet, BWC 10 Step Program, Bullying and PERRP Posters, Safety Data Sheets, and numbering of doors for security.
- As Operation and Maintenance manuals get turned over to us from the project, we are putting together detailed preventative maintenance schedules to keep the new equipment running effectively and efficiently.
- Apollo received the “Special” award from the West Central Ohio Safety Council for going 634,418 hours without a lost time accident.
- We have scheduled an auction for Saturday, April 23 beginning at 9:00 a.m. at the Breese Road storage building.
- We have scheduled all our inspections and summer work. We put together a summer schedule for maintenance/custodial staff. We have a lot more square footage to maintain now.
