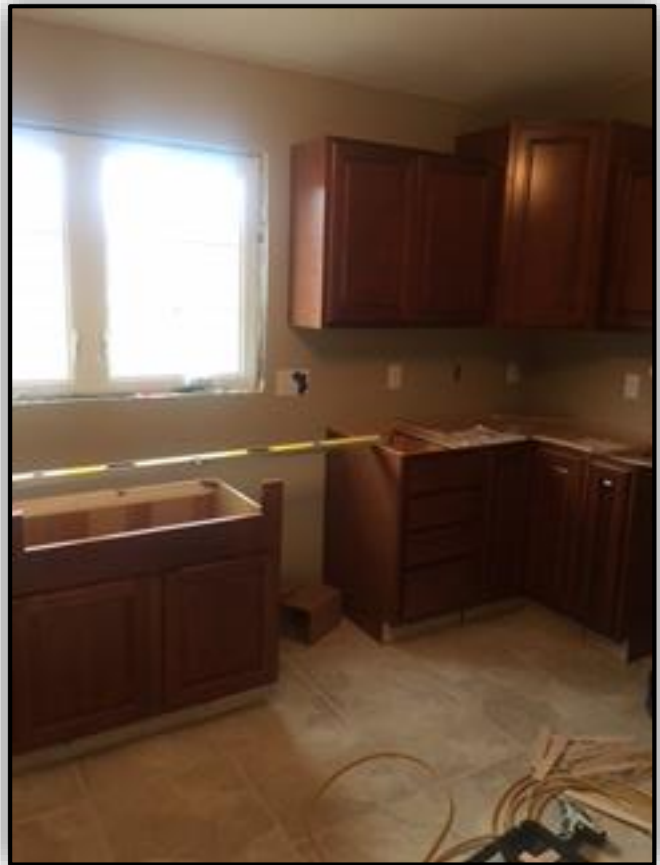

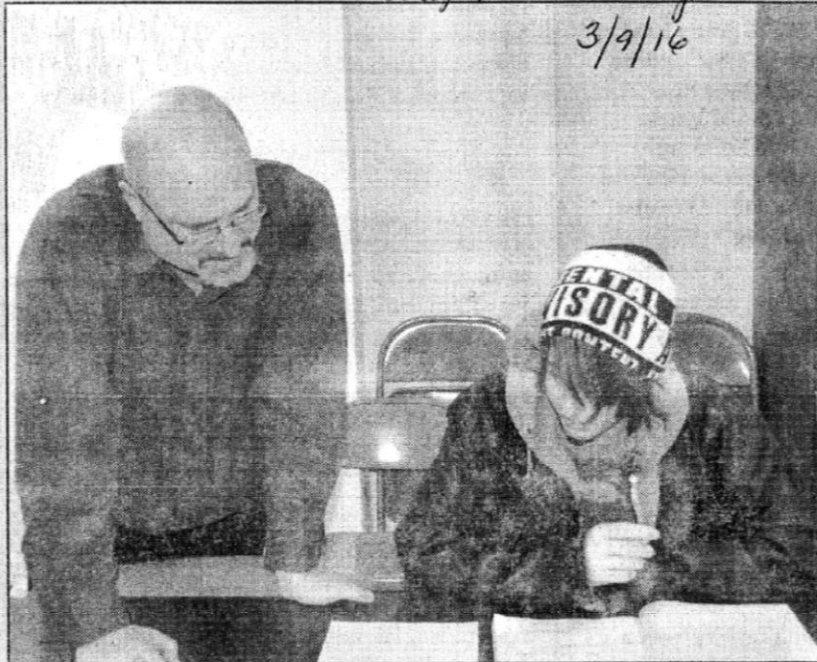

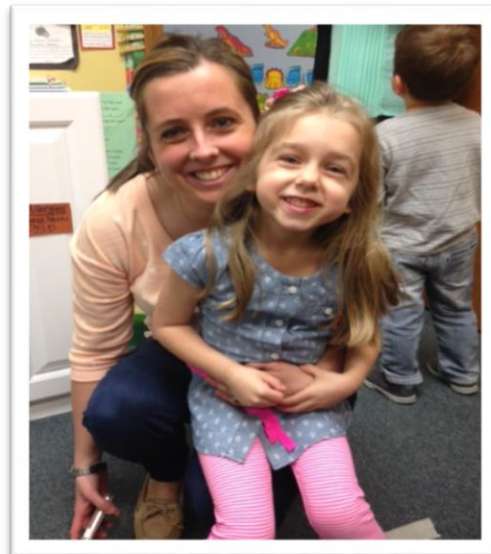

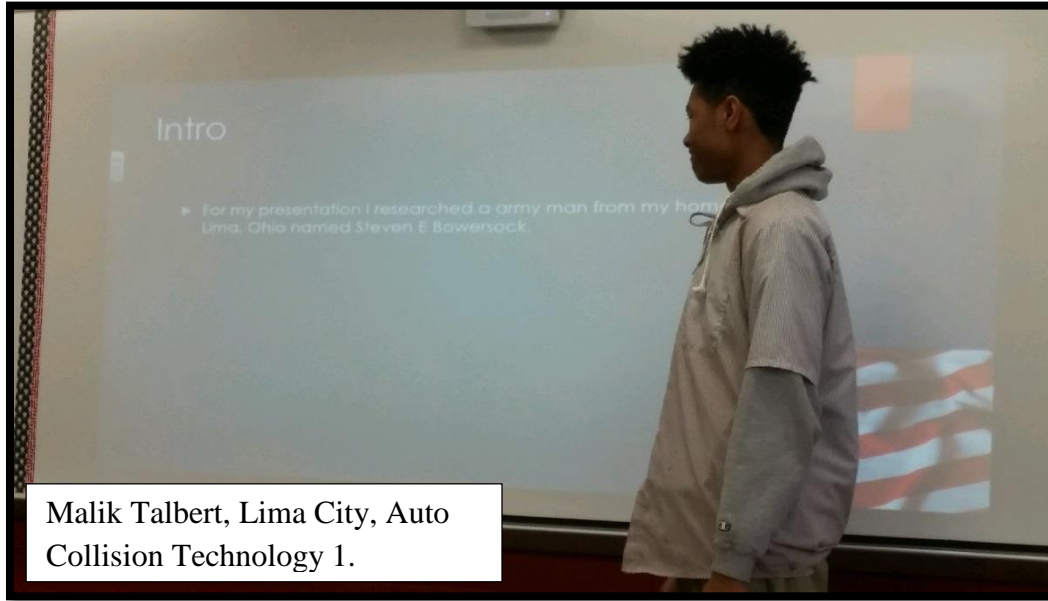

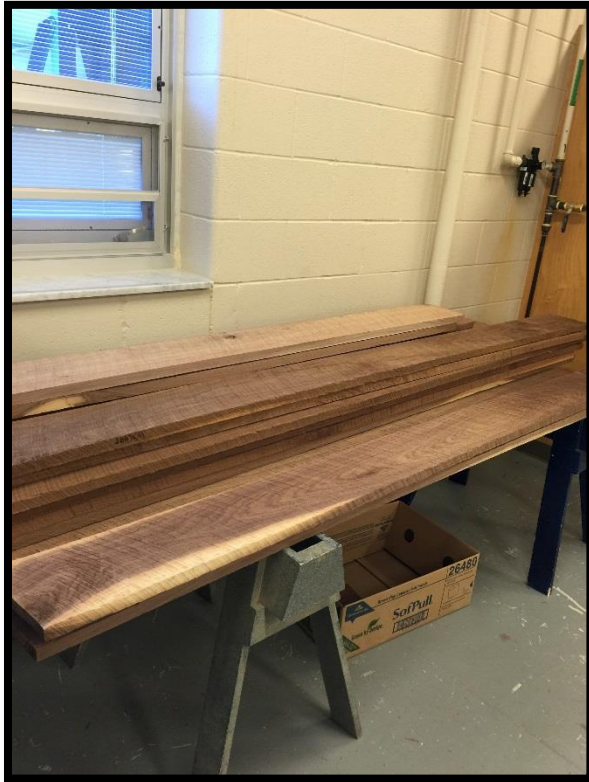

Ian Klaus, a senior in Construction Tech Design and Build II, completed his Senior Woodworking project. He chose to build a classic heirloom bed, then finished it with three coats of lacquer finish. Made from solid cherry, this bed frame will testify to its maker's skills for generations. As shown in the picture, this heirloom bed frame will fit a queen-size mattress and box spring. The bed uses steel knock-down fasteners to easily connect the rails to the headboard and footboard.





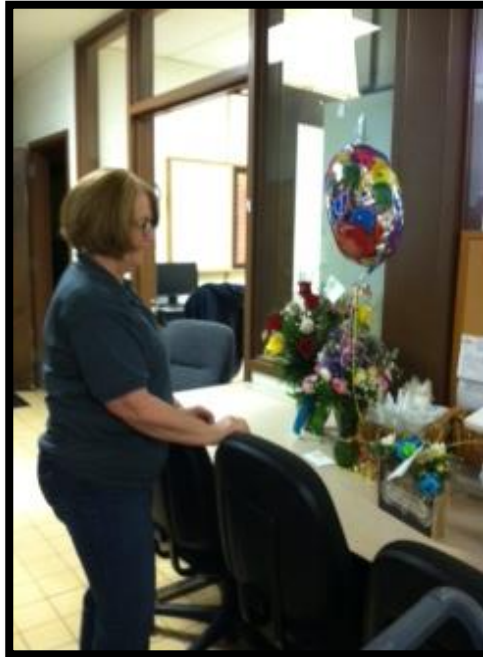
Pictured is a unique before-and-after picture of a student's senior woodworking project recently completed in class.

Senior, Dylan Holcomb, a third year student in Construction Tech Design and Build II, recently completed his senior project. As shown in the before-and-after pictures, Dylan personally went to the Siefker Sawmill and hand-picked all the walnut lumber he would need to build this classic heirloom bed. When completed, he then sprayed it with three coats of lacquer for a great looking finish, highlighting the beautiful walnut grain and then used steel knock-down fasteners to easily connect the rails to the headboard and footboard. The craftsmanship as shown in this bed is impressive.

LAB LOCKOUT – After attending the Spring OTIESA Conference, I received information about a process called “Lab Lockout.” This is ultimately a way to help students see the importance of getting their missing assignments turned in and also helping the teachers, especially since it is hard to assign detentions or Saturday schools with students coming from varying distances and not all students being able to drive. Another career tech center implemented this process three years ago and have made changes that were best for them each year. Their results showed a difference in the number of students completing their work on time, as well as a higher percentage of students graduating on time! We have just started to try this process with our seniors for the last nine weeks of this school year. Senior names were turned into the Guidance Office if they had an F and a missing assignment. They were then locked out of lab on Friday for the duration of the lab period to work on their missing assignments. We are hoping that this process helps our students understand the importance of completing all of their work and receiving passing grades in order to graduate on time!
