




### Apollo Fusion: Advisors: Tasha Sheipline, Darla Krites and Courtnee Morris

### **Project Update:**

- We still have a number of punch items that are getting finished up.
- We have finished the first round of control system and lighting software training with Wadsworth, but still don't have all the graphics completed. We are scheduling quarterly training.
- We are still waiting on as-built drawings, some of the operation manuals, and some of the warranty information. We are working through Touchstone to get these items to us.
- We have had a fairly large list of kitchen issues that are ongoing. Polsters have been at the school numerous times since we started in September. We have been able to stay operating but we have been pushing hard to get all the issues resolved.

#### **Facilities:**

- Respirator fit-testing for the auto collision classes and the maintenance department have been completed with St Rita's for this year.
- Scheduled our annual back-flow, sprinkler, and fire testing for Christmas shutdown.
- We have processed 32 work requests just in the first week of October.
- We finished cleaning out the rented storage building at 2050 Breese Road and have ended our lease. We have been trying to get the maintenance storage building and central receiving cleaned out as we have time as well.
- There is a lot more preventative maintenance required because of the amount of new equipment. The maintenance crew has been working hard keeping up with PM's, training, and fixing various "bugs" that are normal with new equipment.
- We are starting to utilize the new control and lighting systems more to save Apollo money in energy savings.

### **Start of School 2016-2017:**

- Helped organize several staff trainings late August / early September.
  - Setup for Schoology Train the Trainers.
  - Setup for Schoology High School Staff Training.
  - New Employees Training.
  - Multiple days of HVAC and Lighting Control Training.
  - Paging System Training and Documentation.
  - Have spent significant time with staff and students on Schoology Logon's, accessing Schoology, etc.
- Helped with presenters for Automotive Summit F09/16/16
- Work on Classroom Projector and Sound Issues w/ Contractors
  - Valley Electric / SecurCom / Sidney Electric.
- Completed installations of new Wireless Access Points
  - Assisted Valley Electric with turnover old/new.
  - Added new WAP's to our NOACSC Management System.
  - \*\*\* We still have outstanding power supply issues, we will pursue this with Valley and G/M until completed. \*\*\*
- Worked (again) with Valley Electric to expand and extend our network into Buildings 'B', 'C,' and 'D' in early September still not completed.

#### Grand Opening – Th09/29/16 and F09/30/16

- This was an EXTREMELY successful two days of events for showcasing our new facility.
- I felt our new Video Wall and Sound System in the Commons worked better than I could have ever hoped for, given the short timeframe from when we took ownership until event start 4:00 p.m., Thursday.
- We were involved with the Grand Opening Ceremony, VIP Reception, Wake Rattle and Roll on Friday morning, and the 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> Grade Tours.

### **Construction Project Update**

- Working with Garmann/Miller and Touchstone on final project issues.
- Our Technology areas have only a few minor issues remaining, and we are meeting with G/M on Thursday.
- Still don't have MARCS' radio system up and running have worked with McAfee systems several times.
- Wireless network upgrade to newest standard not complete (above) need additional power supplies in our network switches to remedy this condition G/M is researching.
- Question(s) on sound system in Garden Café (remove bells and paging from Restaurant seating area).
- Still chasing some nagging classroom sound and projector issues (some of these have been ongoing since first 'turnover' during Phase 1).
- Waiting to work with Netech/Presidio on final turnover of cameras and video surveillance system.
- Sidney Electric has done us (Technology Services) a few favors during our closeout with them. They spent an extra couple of hours helping us find the panel locations and breaker numbers of each electrical circuit in our telecommunication closets, and conducted an additional test of our emergency power generator (at our request).
- Video Wall Progress there is another piece of equipment and software system that is not installed yet (Windowing Processor) there was a recent engineering change to this component, and the manufacturer has not released it yet we will receive additional training and assistance when this is completed.
