- We discovered frosting around the perimeter walls in the kitchen's walk-in freezer due to bad seals allowing air into the unit. Rightway Food Services loaned us a freezer trailer so we could empty the walk-in unit, let it dry out and caulk the interior. It worked out that school was closed due to cold temperatures that day but it was not a lot of fun loading a freezer truck when it was so frigid outside.
- We installed check valves on every gas line run into the high school and adult welding booths. The labs were having issues with bad welds due to some of the gasses mixing when shut-off valves were not turned off properly.
- The Safety Committee met on January 15. Topics included accident reports, CrisisGo drills, lockdown drills, national trends on school safety, the Federal Commission on School Safety, history of school violence, BWC Safety Grant, P.A. testing and the Parkland Shooting Critical Moments video.
- An area of safety training that was discussed in both our Admin and Safety committee meetings was having all staff practice doing P.A. announcements to have a better comfort level if there was ever an emergency. We plan to have staff do these tests several times per year.

- We have received the Electric Vehicle Charging Stations and Sidney Electric has been working on running the electrical. Weather permitting, a boring crew will be on-site February 8 so Sidney can get the cable run to where the stations will be located. I have been working with ChargePoint on the licensing, training and how customers will pay for the use of the stations. We are hoping the stations will be up and running by the middle of February.
 - We had a good turnout on bid day for the front concrete parking project. Eleven contractors issued bids and Hartman Concrete from Jenera, Ohio, was the low bidder. I have checked their references and they seem to be a good contractor. When the weather breaks in the spring, we will schedule the work.
 - We have applied for Intervention and Safety/Security grants through the BWC. Both grants are 3 to 1 matching with up to a \$40,000 payout. I will update the board if/when the grants are approved.
 - Our staff has been very busy with snow and ice removal over the last few weeks. The frigid temperatures have also caused some mechanical issues that required a lot of our attention.

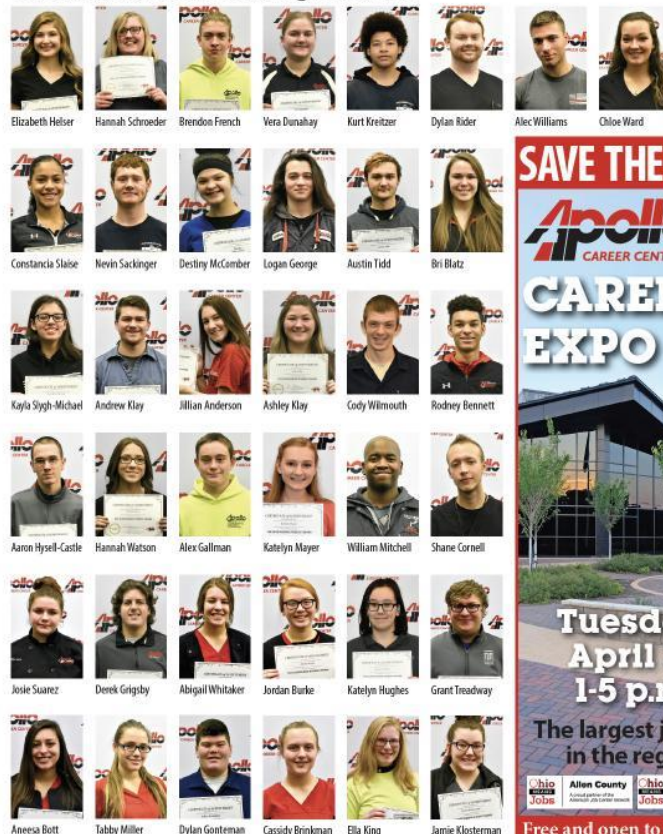
