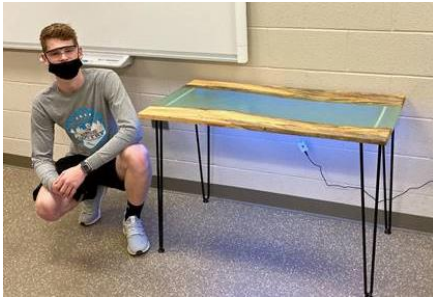
- We began CDL customized training for a Freightliner dealership (McCoy Group).

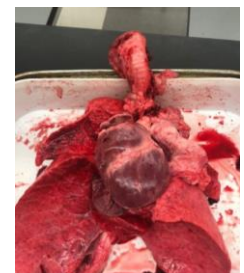
