➤ **Admissions update:** We've had over 600 applicants for the 21-22 school year. 537 students are tentatively placed into programs and 80 students are currently on the waiting list for first and second choice programs and have not been placed yet. All career tech programs have reached their maximum number, except for Project SEARCH and Floral Marketing Interiors. Member schools are still making their decisions on their two choices for the Career Explorations 10th grade program, which is projected to fill by June with some on the waiting list. We are currently up 59 students tentatively placed compared to last year at this time.

- Early Childhood Education
 - We are looking at new textbooks and workbooks to improve teaching/learning and CDA credential passage rates.
 - Charlotte has been working with our ECE partners in getting employees at the locations to become PD Specialists.
 - A TEACH grant was obtained and available for any student wanting to take the CDA credentialing exam/process.
 - Hannah Sumption has earned her CDA.
 - Culinary Arts
 - The entire junior (1st year) class passed their ProStart credential (9 pts.). Along with their ServSafe credential (3 pts), all students have met the 12 point credential alternative pathway for graduation.
 - Three juniors will be attending Sullivan University Culinary Camp this summer.
 - Students catered the National Technical Honor Society ceremony.
 - Students created box lunches for students being honored at the Awards Assembly.
 - Science
 - Mrs. Stein's Chemistry class completed a Murder Mystery lab where students used chemistry, scientific method, density, proper lab procedures, etc. to solve the mystery. It was a great authentic assessment that kept students engaged and interested.
 - Anatomy students dissected the eye of a cow.
 - Environmental science students have been learning about human population growth and the impact on society.
 - Students completed the Biology end-of-course exams.
 - Social Studies
 - Students completed the American government unit and the end-of-course exam.
 - Financial Literacy is the current unit. Topics include checking and savings, budgeting, and credit.
 - Math
 - The department has been working on a curriculum map for Integrated Math 4, a new course.
 - Mr. DuBois is working on materials for a new course (Advanced Math 2).
 - Mrs. Holbrook and Mr. DuBois have been leading the way with the new math vendor assessment (Exam Test Gen by Pearson).
 - Students completed the end-of-course exams for Geometry and Algebra 1.
 - Mrs. Hemmelgarn and Mrs. Holbrook are leading the department in data collection and sharing strategies.
 - PBIS
 - A school climate survey was completed and the student results were shared with staff for analysis and reflection.
 - SSTR6 came to Apollo to conduct the Tiered Fidelity Inventory.
 - Signage was recreated and will be posted over the summer.
 - The Leadership course is being utilized for student input regarding school climate and culture as well as the PBIS system.

- I interviewed several candidates for the open custodial positions. Jady Adkins and Sheila Prater were hired and I think they will be great assets to the maintenance department.
- Adult Ed LPN purchased new office furniture. We moved the old furniture out to the Lowry building and assisted with the installation of the new furniture.
- We ran a dedicated 120-volt circuit for the new TA simulator for the Adult Ed. Truck Driving program.
- I applied for and was approved for a School Safety and Security grant from the Bureau of Workers' Compensation. With this money, I was able to order 4 new floor scrubbers, which will significantly increase the efficiency of the custodial crew and help reduce work-related injuries.
- A lot of time has been spent planning, scheduling, and ordering materials for summer cleaning and special projects.
- In April we completed 14 preventative maintenance tasks and 37 maintenance requests.

- End-of-course exams proceeded fairly smooth this year – we did find that some of our older laptops did not perform well and had to do some 'quick swaps'.
- We assisted with prom setup, several employability guest speakers, Shawnee Schools levy meetings and a large TechCred presentation.
- We are working with the maintenance dept. on two large displays to be mounted in the Commons. One of the displays arrived damaged and had to be returned.
- An older 'Remote Access Server' was shut down and fully incorporated into a new system for managing remote access for staff.
- We assisted with the relocation of staff in three adult ed. offices – this included additional network cabling and equipment moves.
- I am working with Keith and Maria on new equipment purchases for deployment over the summer.
- Technology Services processed 184 Help Desk trouble tickets in April.
