


# November 2025 Administrative Updates

# Nick Sammetinger High School Principal

#### ➤ General:

- Mrs. Diglia set up a Health Partners of Western Ohio Vision Outreach program this year for students to receive a free eye exam . Of the 37 students that participated, 12 received glasses.
- Culinary Arts students competed at the Ohio Hospitality CTSO competition in Delaware, OH. Students winning first or second places also earned Sullivan University Scholarships:

  middle school waiver. The new hot topic is CTAG/ITAG weighted grades. All CT programs
  must have at least one course associated with a CTAG. This means students earning a CTAG
  must have that grade weighted equivalently to a CCP course if their
  school weights grades for AP or CCP and/or ranks students,
